


Oostburg N.A.S.P. Archery TRY OUTS for 5th Grade Archery Team

REQUIRED PARENT/STUDENT MEETING at 5:30pm - Tryouts to follow from 6:00-7:00 pm
Tuesday Jan. 16 and Thursday Jan. 25

Required meeting will cover 11 steps of NASP archery to safe shooting. Introduction of equipment and whistle commands while within the archery range. Archers will shoot a nominal number of arrows at 5-7 meters during the tryouts. If they are selected for the team archers will practice to eventually shoot at 10 meters and 15 meters. A limited number of spots are available. Team selection will be posted by Feb.1.

Practices schedule: Tuesdays from 6:00-7:00 pm in the middle school gym on the following dates: Feb. 6, 13, 20, 27 and March 13 and 20 . Participation fee \$30.

What is NASP?

The National Archery in the Schools Program (NASP®) is a 501 c (3) non-profit educational foundation established to teach target archery as part of the in-school curriculum. NASP® is cooperative effort between conservation agencies, private organizations, and school systems to engage more students in the educational process.”

What are the NASP equipment and shooting guidelines?

Archery Equipment used in NASP® is highly standardized to be safe, durable, economical, and most importantly, universal fit for almost every student. In NASP® learning the “process” of shooting is stressed far more than arrow scores. The only bow used in NASP® is a “Genesis®” compound which has no let-off and is adjustable from 10-20 pounds in draw weight at any draw length. Only full-length aluminum arrows are used in NASP® to fit every student and to preserve NASP®’s perfect safety record. Sights, release aids, and stabilizers are kept out of NASP® to facilitate equipment sharing among students in archery class. Finally, NASP® students are taught to shoot at an international, 80 centimeter target face. While students start learning at an “always hit” distance of 5-7 yards or meters, competitive distances in NASP® are 10 and 15 meters.
